## **Essence of SGVV**

Sinduartola Gramodaya Vikas Vidyalaya (SGVV) is a non-profit organization established in 1975 with a vision to create an egalitarian society where every individual has the opportunity to thrive. Initially SGVV started with a small learning centre for the children of the destitute community. Later, SGVV was registered as a legal entity under Society Registration Act 21-1860 in the year 1978. The organization started working with marginalized communities, including tribal and minority groups, marginal farmers, landless labourers, daily wage earners, displaced people, trafficked women, and girls with disabilities.

Now SGVV's programs focus on women's empowerment, promoting self-sufficiency through training and education. In the area of livelihood promotion, the organization supports marginalized communities in income generation through agriculture, handicrafts, and small-scale industries. SGVV also prioritizes health awareness, raising awareness about health issues and providing access to healthcare services. Additionally, the organization is committed to community development, strengthening local communities through programs focused on education, infrastructure, and social welfare. To protect children, SGVV works to combat child labour and trafficking, ensuring the well-being of children in vulnerable situations. Environmental sustainability is another key focus of SGVV. The organization works to protect and preserve the natural environment, promoting sustainable practices and addressing environmental challenges. Furthermore, SGVV is dedicated to social justice, combating corruption, discrimination, and exploitation. The organization strives to rehabilitate displaced individuals, child labourers, and trafficked girls, assisting them in reclaiming their rights and accessing opportunities they rightfully deserve.

# **OUR INITIATIVES**

## **1. CHILD RIGHTS AND PROTECTION :**

SGVV has been consistently working towards the protection and promotion of child rights in rural and tribal communities of Jharkhand. Our efforts focus on the prevention of child marriages through sustained community awareness on its negative impacts on children's health, education, and overall well-being. SGVV actively supports survivors of POCSO cases, providing them with legal assistance, psychological counseling, and linkage with support systems to ensure justice and rehabilitation. The organization has also been involved in the rescue of child laborers, working towards their rehabilitation and reintegration into mainstream education. Through community engagement, awareness drives, capacity building of Self-Help Groups (SHGs), and collaboration with child protection mechanisms, SGVV continues to empower communities to stand against child rights violations and create safer, supportive environments for children.

## **2. WOMEN EMPOWERMENT :**

SGVV is committed to empowering women in rural and tribal communities by promoting economic independence, leadership, and awareness of rights. Through the formation and strengthening of Self-Help Groups (SHGs), women are engaged in livelihood activities, savings, and income generation. SGVV conducts regular trainings and awareness programs on legal rights, gender equality, health, and protection against violence. Women are encouraged to participate in Gram Sabhas and community decision-making, enhancing their leadership and agency. The organization also raises awareness on safe migration, financial literacy, and access to government schemes, enabling women to build secure and self-reliant futures.

### 3. Anti-Trafficking & Safe Migration :

For over a decade, SGVW has been at the forefront of combating trafficking and promoting safe migration across 200+ villages in Jharkhand, with a strong focus on protecting adolescent and young girls (A&YGs). As an active member of the Jharkhand Anti-Trafficking Network (JATN), we have played a key role in policy advocacy—most notably, in the passage of the Jharkhand Domestic Workers Private Placement Agency Act, 2016, and are currently contributing to drafting its operational rules. Our work extends from grassroots mobilization to direct intervention: empowering 20 at-risk A&YG groups, establishing 20 Village Vigilance Committees, and sensitizing entire communities to the dangers of unsafe migration. These collective efforts have created a protective ecosystem in our target areas, leading to the rescue of several children from trafficking in Ranchi district.

### 4. Strengthening Gram Sabha and PRI :

Recognizing the persistent challenges in local self-governance across Jharkhand, SGVW has taken concrete steps to strengthen Gram Sabhas and Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs). We have facilitated the establishment of Gram Sachivalayas in several villages, creating accessible centers for local administration and service delivery. Through continuous capacity building and technical support, we've empowered communities to take charge of their development. Our efforts have also enabled hundreds of villagers to access key government schemes such as MGNREGA, Vridha Pension Yojana, and others—promoting democracy, decentralization, and inclusive growth at the grassroots level.

### 5. Health, Hygiene & Sanitation :

SGVW has led impactful health and sanitation initiatives, reaching over 5,000 SHG families through health camps and immunization awareness. We've promoted hygiene practices, built 2,000 low-cost toilets under the TSC program, and established free sanitary pad booths in schools—leading to improved health outcomes and greater dignity for women and girls in our communities.

# WORKING AREAS

## 1. Promoting safe mobility and counter trafficking in Jharkhand



Funding Partner: British Asian Trust (BAT)  
Implementing Network: Jharkhand Anti-Trafficking Network (JATN)

Under this project, SGVV has been working in 2 district to promote safe migration practices and prevent human trafficking. Key achievements include:

- Established 20+ migrant forums at the community level to share information on safe migration, women's rights, labour rights, and trafficking prevention.
- Implemented awareness campaigns using IEC materials and community meetings—including outreach during COVID-19.
- Engaged with 800+ people directly through awareness drives, training programs, and community meetings.
- Worked closely with village communities, Panchayat representatives, district officials, and frontline workers such as Sahiya Didi's and Anganwadi workers to build capacity and strengthen prevention measures.
- Advocated for the integration of safe migration practices into local governance structures and state-level policies and programs.



The project adopts a rights-based approach, with a strong focus on gender justice and the protection of marginalized groups, especially women and children.

## CASE STORY

# From Darkness to Dawn: The Rescue of Eight Child Labourers

On a humid morning of October 4, 2024, a desperate tip-off reached the Sinduartola Gramodaya Vikas Vidyalay (SGVV) in Ranchi. The message was chilling—minor children were being forced to work in a Ladoo factory in Adalhatu. Without hesitation, SGVV alerted the Anti-Human Trafficking Unit (AHTU) and Bachpan Bachao Andolan. A rescue team was swiftly formed, including members from child welfare organizations, social workers from SGVV plus from other NGO's, and local police. Their mission was clear—bring those children to safety.

Inside the dimly lit workshop, the sight was heartbreaking. Eight children, aged between 10 and 17, sat hunched over, their tiny hands tirelessly stirring, shaping, and packing ladoos in suffocating heat. They had been lured from their villages with false promises—assured that they would be paid well and enrolled in good schools. Instead, they found themselves trapped in relentless labor from 6 AM to 9:30 PM, with no education, no wages, and barely enough food to survive. Worse still, they were forced to cook their own meals after a long day of exhausting work.



CHILDREN WHILE RESCUE PROCESS

As the rescue team entered, fear gripped the children. Some froze, while others stole nervous glances at their employer—a man who had deceived them with dreams of a better future. Thirteen-year-old Saurabh Kumar whispered that he hadn't seen his family in months. Eleven-year-old Sunil Kumar rubbed his exhausted eyes, while the youngest, Nitish Kumar, just 10, trembled as he recalled how, night after night, he wished to escape but had nowhere to go.

With gentle reassurances, the rescuers led all eight children out. Their trafficker was arrested, and the illegal factory was shut down. At a shelter home in Ranchi, the children were met with warmth—clean clothes, fresh food, and soft beds. For the first time in months, they slept without :

The Child Welfare Committee (CWC) and trained counsellors from SGVV listened to their stories, offering not just comfort but a promise of a better future. Under the Child Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986, and the Bonded Labour System (Abolition) Act, 1976, each child was entitled to ₹20,000 for rehabilitation. More importantly, NGOs stepped in to ensure they were enrolled in schools and given a chance to reclaim their childhood.

A few weeks later, with the help of the CWC and SGVV, they returned to their families in Bihar. Their days of forced labor were over, replaced with schoolbooks, playgrounds, and dreams that no longer seemed impossible. However, SGVV's role did not end with the rescue. The organization is continuously monitoring the well-being of the children, ensuring their rehabilitation is safe, smooth, and sustainable. Regular follow-ups with families, school enrolments, and emotional support remain a priority to prevent them from falling into the same trap again.

That day, eight pairs of hands—once bound to endless work—were finally free. And with that freedom came dignity, hope, and a future worth fighting for.

## 2. Pre School Nutrition and Education and RAHAT Support

This project, led by the Jiv Daya Foundation (JDF) in collaboration with Sinduartola Gramodaya Vikas Vidyalaya (SGVV), addresses the pressing issues of malnutrition and food insecurity in Khunti District, Jharkhand.

The program focuses on combating malnourishment in early childhood by providing daily milk and biscuits to 150 children across six villages, directly supporting their physical growth, cognitive development, and access to education.

Rahat Support Initiative to strengthen household food security, the Rahat Support initiative provides essential dry ration kits to vulnerable families facing severe socio-economic challenges. In the past year, SGVV distributed ration twice a year to 150 poor families in six villages, ensuring consistent access to basic nutrition and sustenance.

Through these interventions, SGVV and JDF are working to break the cycle of malnutrition, improve child health outcomes, and provide a foundation for better educational opportunities in the region.

### 3. Access to Justice

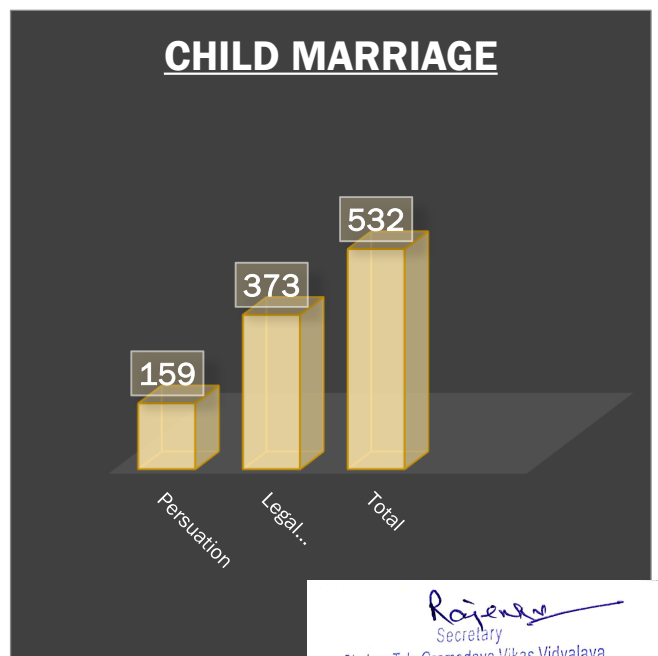
Sinduar Tola Gramodaya Vikas Vidyalaya (SGVV), with the support of the Kailash Satyarthi Children's Foundation (KSCF), has been working tirelessly to ensure "Access to Justice" for vulnerable children in Ranchi district. The program is designed to combat child labour, child trafficking, child marriage, and child sexual abuse, while strengthening child protection mechanisms at the grassroots.

Our operational focus covers majorly Ormanjhi and Mandar blocks, comprising 63+ villages across 10+ panchayats. Through continuous engagement with children, families, community leaders, and government institutions, SGVV is creating safer environments for children.

#### Key Achievements-

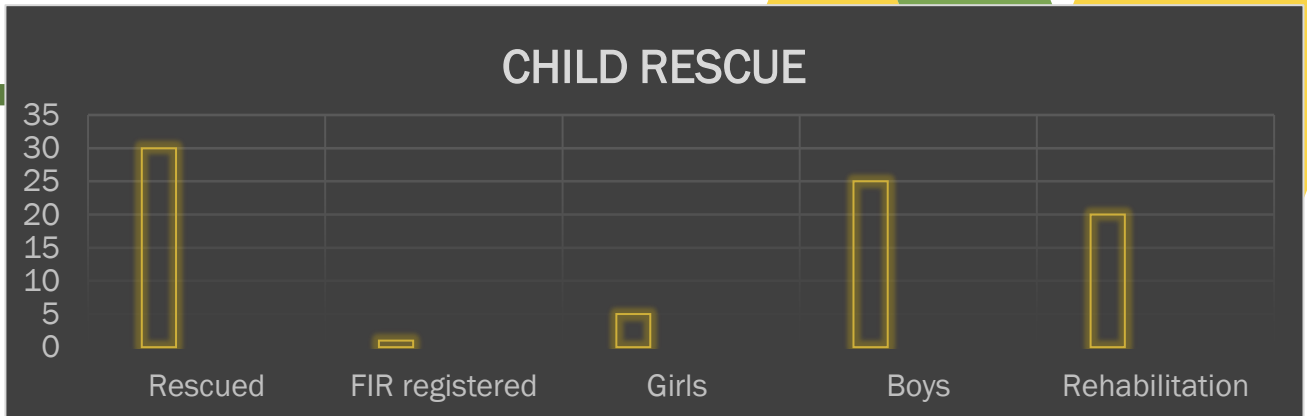
##### 1. Prevention of Child Marriage

- Special campaigns were organized around Akshaya Tithi, a period often associated with child marriages.
- Government officials at district, block, and panchayat levels were sensitized about their duty to prevent child marriages.
- Religious leaders were engaged and administered an oath to not solemnize child marriages, reinforcing their legal implications.
- Awareness posters were displayed in 300+ religious places including temples, mosques, churches, and gurudwaras across Ranchi (Ormanjhi, Bedo, Anagada, and nearby blocks).
- Through these concerted efforts, the initiative successfully prevented 500+ child marriages across Ranchi district.



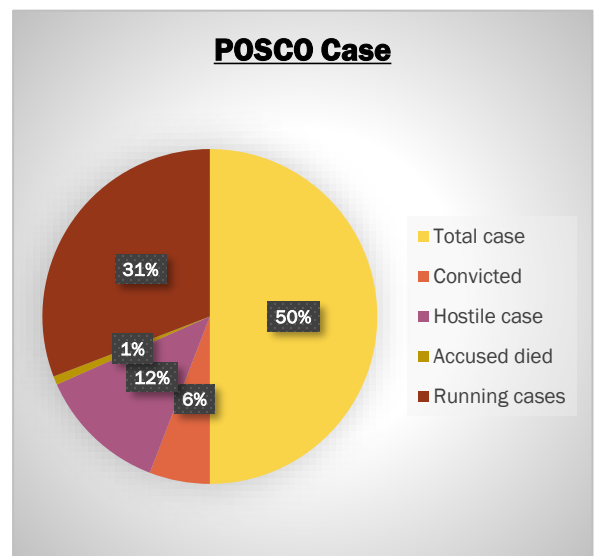
## 2. Rescue & Rehabilitation

- 30 children rescued from child labour and trafficking situations during the reporting period.
- SGVV provided immediate relief and coordinated with relevant authorities for rehabilitation and reintegration.



## 3. Access to Justice in POCSO Cases

- SGVV actively supported POCSO (Protection of Children from Sexual Offences) cases, ensuring survivors received legal and emotional support.
- 7 perpetrators were convicted under law, strengthening accountability and reinforcing child protection.



## IMPACT

Through awareness, prevention, rescue, and justice interventions, SGVV has been able to mobilize communities, local governance institutions, and faith leaders to take collective responsibility for protecting children. The program has not only prevented violations but also created a deterrent effect by ensuring legal action against offenders.

## CASE STORY

# **Amrita's Fight Against Child Marriage**

Amrita Kumari, a bright 16-year-old girl from the quiet village of Sarnatoli Jaria in Ranchi, Jharkhand, had always dreamed of completing her education. She was a diligent student at +2 High School, Bedo, and loved learning. One afternoon, an NGO named Sinduar Tola Gramodaya Vikas Vidyalaya (SGVV) visited her school. Their team conducted an awareness session on child rights, focusing on issues like child marriage, child labor, trafficking, and abuse. Amrita listened carefully, absorbing every word. She noted down the contact details of Mrs. Shanti Devi, a community social worker of SGVV who spoke passionately about empowering girls to stand up for their rights.

Months later, Amrita's parents made a decision that shattered her dreams—her marriage was arranged in Bedo block, Ranchi. Invitations were printed and distributed, and preparations were in full swing. Amrita, however, did not want to get married. She wanted to study, to chase her dreams, but she was too afraid to speak against her parents' wishes.

Feeling trapped, she turned to her best friend, Sunita Kumari. In hushed whispers, she shared her fears, her desire to stay in school, and her helplessness in opposing her parents. Sunita, refusing to let her friend's future slip away, immediately reached out to Mrs. Shanti Devi.

SGVV wasted no time. Within hours, Shanti Devi and her team arrived at Amrita's house. They spoke to her father, Mr. Baldev Gope, about the harmful consequences of child marriage. They explained how it would disrupt Amrita's education, put her health at risk, and rob her of her childhood. They also informed him about the legal actions that could be taken against those who facilitated child marriage.

At first, Amrita's father resisted. He argued that marriage was a tradition, that it was for Amrita's own good. But as the conversation continued, as he listened to the risks and the laws, doubt crept into his mind. The SGVV team then took the matter to the Bedo Police Station, filing an official complaint (FIR No. 17/2025) on March 8, 2025.

With pressure mounting, Amrita's parents agreed to stop the marriage, but a challenge remained—the wedding invitations had already been sent out. To avoid social embarrassment, they requested a meeting with the groom's family to formally cancel the wedding.

On the day of the meeting, both families gathered at Amrita's home. The air was tense as discussions began. Mr. Sandeep Kumar from SGVV asked Amrita's parents if they truly wanted to proceed with the wedding. This time, with conviction, they said no. He then turned to the groom's family, who, after some deliberation, agreed to call off the marriage.

A formal agreement was drafted, read aloud, and signed by all present. Copies were given to both families and the original was submitted to the Bedo Police Station to ensure legal closure.

As the meeting ended, Amrita felt a wave of relief wash over her. She had been on the verge of losing her dreams, but now, she had reclaimed her future. She turned to Shanti Devi and Sunita, her eyes brimming with gratitude. "Without SGVV and Shanti Devi, I would have been married off against my will. They saved my future, my life."

She hugged Sunita tightly. "And you, my best friend—you were my voice when I couldn't speak. Without you, none of this would have been possible."

Amrita's case highlights the power of awareness, education, and community support in combating social evils like child marriage. This success story reinforces the importance of grassroots organizations like SGVV in empowering young girls and ensuring their right to education and self-determination. Amrita now stands as an inspiration for other girls in her village to fight for their rights and make informed choices about their future.

## 4. Strengthening of Local Governance in Jharkhand

This project aims to empower and uplift 20 villages in Rania block, Khunti District, Jharkhand by strengthening local governance systems, promoting inclusivity, and encouraging active participation in Gram Sabhas.

Through targeted capacity-building programs, 40% of households have been capacitated on the importance of Gram Sabhas and the role of Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRI) in village development. As a result, participation in Gram Sabhas has grown significantly, with women now actively presenting their demands before the Panchayat.

To strengthen local governance structures, the project facilitated the opening of two Sachivalayas (village secretariats) and supported the regular conduct of Gram Sabha meetings across all 20 villages. In addition, linkages with government welfare programs have enabled 7% of total eligible households to access benefits, helping them improve their socio-economic conditions.

These combined efforts are transforming grassroots governance by institutionalizing Gram Sabha practices, improving community access to welfare schemes, and creating a more inclusive decision-making environment. By fostering accountability, women's leadership, and self-reliance, the initiative is laying the foundation for sustainable development and long-term prosperity in Khunti district.



### Impact

The project has created a vibrant culture of participation and accountability within the community. Women and marginalized groups now have a stronger voice in village decision-making, households are increasingly accessing government entitlements, and local governance structures have become more responsive. By bridging the gap between communities and institutions, the initiative is ensuring that development is both people-driven and sustainable. Its long-term impact lies in building empowered, self-reliant villages that can continue to thrive beyond the life of the project.

Two feet ahead together is a project funded by Kinderpotzels with the core aim is to empower adolescent children in the age group of 12-18 with critical thinking and problem-solving skills, enabling them to support each other effectively. To achieve this, the project creates a safe and inclusive environment by collaborating with various stakeholders. The project will be carried out in 90 villages across Ramgarh, Gumla, and Ranchi, benefiting 9000+ children. In these districts, diverse challenges hinder children's growth and engagement. It seeks to bridge educational gaps and create an enabling environment for these children to thrive. By reaching out to these vulnerable children and implementing community-based interventions, the project aims to ensure that no child is left behind, bringing the initiative to a saturation level of coverage and making a substantial impact on their lives and future prospects

### 1. Peer-Led Project Assessment TFAT – Puri, Odisha (August 2024)

- **Duration:** 4 days (Aug 9–12)
- **Focus:** Participatory evaluation with adolescents
- **Activities:**
  - Orientation & body mapping of pre/post-project experiences
  - Red-Green-Yellow card assessment to measure impact
  - Problem-solving & ideation on community challenges
  - Life skills training & motivational sessions
  - Cultural nights and local exploration tours
- **Outcome:** Enhanced participant engagement and actionable feedback for project improvement



## 2. SRHR Project: Phased Approach (Sep 2024 – Feb 2025)

- **Phase 1:** FGDs & IDIs to understand baseline scenario
- **Phase 2:** Quantitative survey to validate findings
- **Phase 3:** District-level consultations addressing emerging needs
- **Impact:** Comprehensive understanding of SRHR challenges and evidence-based interventions



## 3. Self-Defense Training – Empowering Girls

- Conducted across three districts, with notable success in Bero Block, Ranchi
- **Impact:**
  - Increased confidence and resilience among girls
  - Ripple effect: trained girls teaching peers
  - Creation of safe, empowered community spaces

## 4. Children Wallet Initiative (Late 2024)

- Enables children to identify and solve community issues
- **Approach:**
  - Advocacy-based solutions (engaging local government)
  - Action-based solutions (planning, budgeting, executing independently)
- **Success Story:** Clearing of blocked drainage system in **Bero Block, Ranchi**
- **Outcome:** Nurtured responsible, active child leaders capable of driving grassroots change



### Key Takeaways

- TFAT reached **9,751 adolescents**, with **5,102 children helping peers**

## 6. Family based Care

The Family-Based Care (FBC) initiative in Jharkhand has made significant progress in strengthening alternative child care models as mandated under the Juvenile Justice Act and the Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS). The project has reached 35 rural villages and 9 urban slum wards, with a focus on kinship care, foster care, sponsorship, and independent living.

### Key Achievements

Ensured educational continuity for children during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Prevented child marriages through counselling and family engagement.

Linked vulnerable families to government welfare schemes for improved resilience.

Enhanced the capacity of frontline teams through training and skill development.

Strengthened child participation, enabling children to voice their needs and influence decisions affecting them.

### Educational Support

We have been actively supporting children in their educational journeys. In 2024, six children received assistance with school registration and admission, ensuring a smooth enrollment process. Additionally, in April 2024, bicycles were provided to three children. This "Cycle Support" helped them overcome distance barriers, giving them easier access to schools and enabling regular attendance.



### Grocery Distribution

In July 2024, groceries were distributed to 16 children. This initiative aimed to meet their basic nutritional needs while reducing the financial burden on their families, ensuring access to essential food items.



### **Income Generation Activity (IGA) Support**

To strengthen families' livelihoods, we provided financial support to 20 families in April and May 2024. Each family received ₹2,000 to start or expand small businesses. The support was used for diverse activities such as goat rearing, piggery, running small hotels, and setting up bangle shops. This initiative empowered families to generate sustainable income and improve their standard of living.



### **Aftercare Need Assessment**

Between December 2024 and March 2025, we conducted an Aftercare Program need assessment across 14 districts of Jharkhand. The assessment focused on mapping the current situation, identifying key stakeholders, and evaluating their skills and resources. Findings from this process guided the design of orientation programs to build capacity and enhance understanding of the updated Aftercare Program guidelines.



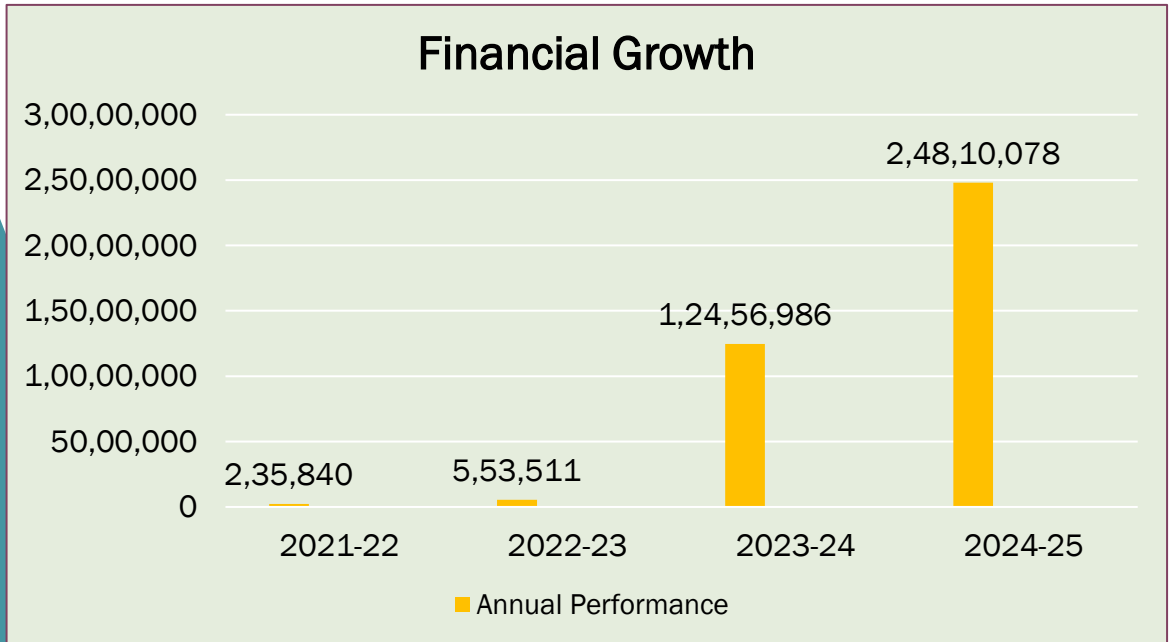
### **District-Level Orientation Programs**

In March 2025, orientation programs were organized in Ranchi and Gumla districts. Participants included staff from the District Child Protection Unit (DCPU), Juvenile Justice Board (JJB), Child Welfare Committee (CWC), Child Care Institutions (CCI), Child Helpline (CHL), and Para Legal Volunteers (PLVs). The sessions strengthened their understanding of updated guidelines and equipped them to effectively implement the Aftercare Program in their respective districts.

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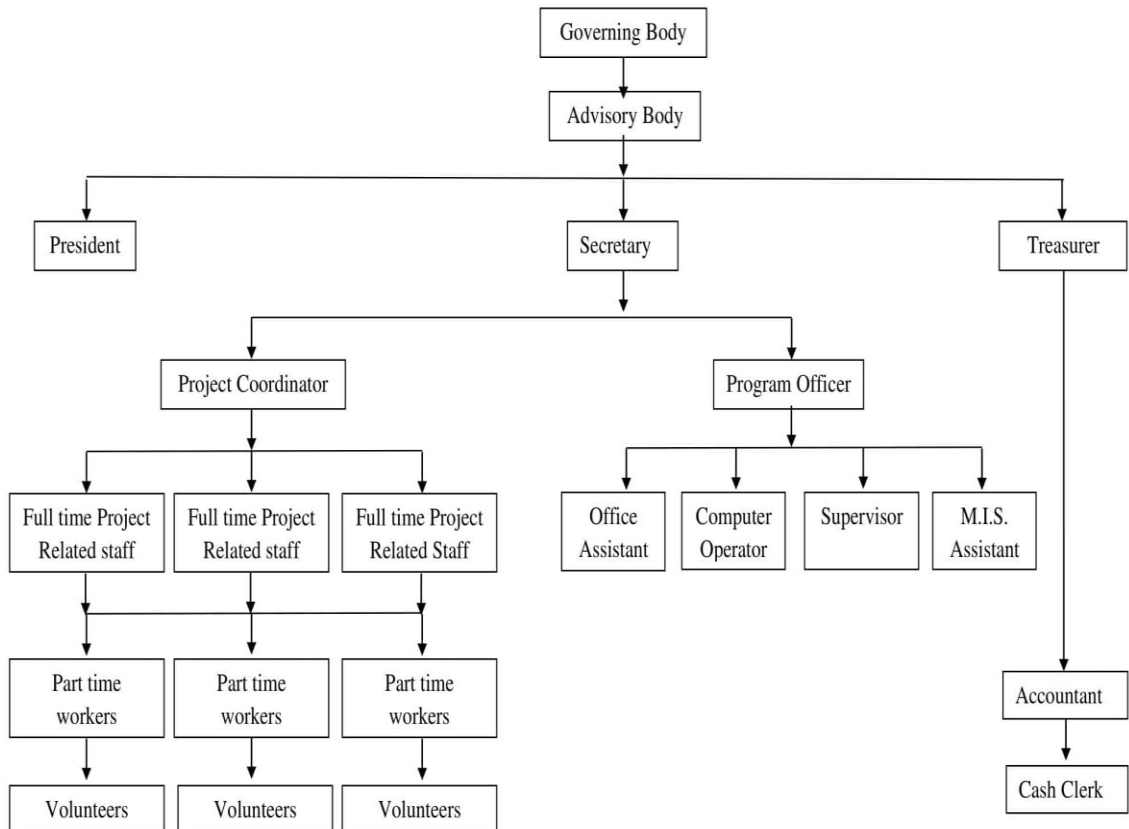
